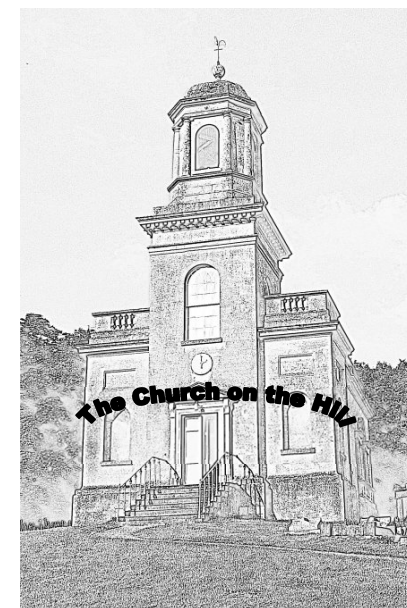

Ministry Musings – Forgiving the Small Stuff –

Throughout August we looked at the story of Joseph, the climax of the story is the moment when Joseph forgives the brothers who tried to kill him and then sold him into slavery.

Some people find themselves in a Joseph position where something massive has happened, something that could overwhelm them with bitterness if they can't forgive and move on.

But - I think - it's usually the smaller day-to-day stuff that really bothers us. The stuff people say or do that wind us up. Stuff we struggle to forgive. We may not want to admit it because if we claim to be Christian we are supposed to be forgiving people right?

But the Church is a hospital for sinners not a museum of saints. Every single one of us gets annoyed by other people. Sometimes they're family members, sometimes they're neighbours, sometimes they're even people from church. We all encounter people who say and do things that really get our stress levels up and these people aren't particularly sorry, they just carry on like that.

So, at worst, we bad mouth them or we scheme against them and, at best, we just let our blood boil and they become a distraction away from living the life of love that God wants.

We have to work hard to overcome and forgive. The Bible specifically teaches us to do so:

In Ephesians 4 Paul says ***Get rid of all bitterness, rage and anger, brawling and slander, along with every form of malice.***

Whilst 1 Peter 3: vv8-9 says ***“be sympathetic, love one another, be compassionate and humble. Do not repay evil with evil or insult with insult. On the contrary, repay evil with blessing”***

Jesus also taught us as he hung dying. In Luke 23:34 he forgave his murderers saying: ***“Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they do.”***

You may be struggling to forgive someone and that line from Jesus isn't helpful because you feel that they know exactly what they're doing. I wonder if that's fully true.

Do people always understand just how much they frustrate us? just how much of a distraction their actions are to us living lives of love? Do they know we are struggling to forgive and it's creating a barrier between us and God?

Maybe if they knew the potential eternal consequence to their actions they would ask God to help them change. But maybe not. Maybe some people don't deserve forgiveness and that's when we really have to work at it. We have to work hard to say: *“I forgive and you don't deserve it, but neither do I.”*

Because do any of us deserve the forgiveness that Jesus worked so hard for? And can we definitely say we don't need the forgiveness of others? We are probably guilty of saying or doing things that hurt others and we maybe aren't even aware of it. The point I'm getting at is John 8:7: ***“Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone”***

We all need the forgiveness of others, we all need the forgiveness of God and we all need to work hard at forgiving the small stuff so it doesn't build up into a huge distraction and a barrier between us and God.

Ride+Stride given go ahead for Saturday 12 September 2020

Over 40 churches in the Diocese of Bristol are excited to join with 90 churches in Salisbury in this years Wiltshire Ride+Stride. Most of the churches will be open on the day, and many will have someone to welcome participants with refreshments.

Last year, over 400 individual sponsored participants participated in the Wiltshire Ride+Stride, raising a total of £60,000!

This year, supporters also have the options simply donating to the Trust, if they don't feel able to partake physically in the event.

Nigel Jackson, Secretary of Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust and Ride+Stride organiser, said:

"The annual Wiltshire Ride & Stride is an enjoyable and purposeful sponsored event that raises much-needed funds to help with repairs and community enhancements in Wiltshire churches and chapels. In this very difficult year, it is hoped that churches will turn out to ride and stride in line with the outdoors exercise guidance from the Government and enjoy whatever they choose to do and the contribution that they make to this crucial Wiltshire fundraising event."

Ride+Stride is a sponsored bike ride or walk supported by the National Churches Trust and organised by local historic churches trusts. Cyclists, walkers, and horse riders raise money by being sponsored to visit local churches on any route of their choice.

The money raised by Ride+Stride is shared evenly between the participant's chosen parish and the Wiltshire Historic Churches Trust. This enables the Trust to further support local churches by making grants for critical church repairs and church facilities.
